Member Profile – Yevette Wroby

Yvette is one of the founding members of the Glen Eira Artists Society, and has served the Society in many statutory roles: Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Membership Officer, Exhibition Convenor as well as convenor of En Plein Air.

She is a versatile artist, cartoonist and a writer with a Curriculum Vitae that attests to many achievements. Her art career speaks volumes of someone who is immersed in writing, painting and drawing. Ever



interested in her art education, she took cartooning courses with the Council of Adult Education; Art and Design at Holmesglen; classes in Life Drawing, and Figurative with Keming Shen and John Lawry. She even took lessons with Monique Foulliard in Aix-en-Prevence, when she travelled to France.

Yvette's foray into art begun in 1974 when she illustrated the university campus newsletter. This bourgeoned over the years as she secured many paid cartoon jobs from a variety of organisations and publications, including a book titled *"Couples with Financial Differences: Can a Saver and a Spender Live in Harmony"*. She also contributed regularly to the Footy Almanac, served as Executive Editor of the Women's Footy Almanac, and illustrated multiple publications. She is a prolific artist and was awarded a number of first prizes and special mentions for works published in *Comic Edge*.

Yvette participated in many GEAS and other exhibitions including a yearlong exhibition at Kinch Café, a venue which she eventually managed to secure for use by other GEAS members on a roster basis. Her first solo exhibition "Wonderful Obsessions" was held in 2013 and is a tribute to her passion – the St. Kilda Football Club which she has staunchly followed since childhood.

To say that Yvette is a supporter of the Saints is a colossal understatement. Following the St. Kilda footy club has been a lifelong passion. She was born and raised in St Kilda and attended games at Moorabbin. Her book *Siren's Call* was published in 2017 and is the result of a season of following the Saints to every game – home and away. The book is much more than a memoir about footy: it is also an insight into the

demands of her family and attending to the needs of her mother (Elfie Rosenberg) through cancer treatment. Yvette loves to talk and write about the Club, and you can recognize her through her red, white and black Saints coloured reading glasses forever on her face.

Yvette has two daughters and a son, plus some added 'drafted' kids who have given her four grandchildren and who are her favorite current art/life inspirations.

Member Profile – Sara Longwood

Originally from Eugene, Oregon USA, Sara's interest in Australia was kindled in childhood when she read *Cooper's Creek*, a book about Burke and Wills' exploration into the centre of Australia. An adventurous

child, she dreamt about visiting Australia and when, in her final vear of her BS in Education at the University of Oregon, she saw a Victorian government recruitment poster asking for primary teachers willing to work in Australia, she leapt at the chance. The terms of the contract were quite attractive: a minimum



stay of 18 months and a tax free salary for two years. Needless to say, Sara signed the contract.

So, in 1971 Sara began teaching, far from family and friends. During her orientation, Sara met two other American teachers and they became fast friends, living together and exploring Melbourne for the next few vears. Sara was assigned a school in Eltham, a school where the staff were deeply against the Vietnam war and the recruitment of US teachers. Despite having protested fervently against the war, Sara found the negative attitude trying, and after a year, transferred to a school in Ascot Vale where she remained for many years, loving the multicultural atmosphere she found there. During her time there, where most of the recently arrived children spoke English as a second or even third language, Sara became more interested in exploring children's thoughts and development without being limited by the pressure of academic achievement, and decided to explore the art curriculum, undertaking a primary art course.

She then moved to Sandown Park Primary School where she remained for a year after which she moved to Toorak Central School where she taught art from Prep to Year 8 students. This marked the beginning of her involvement in the creative arts. At the Toorak Central School, art was seen as a valuable and integral part of each child's education. During her time there, her students produced theme-based annual installation art projects in the National Gallery. Sadly, this opportunity is no longer available for primary students. After many years, Sara undertook a three year Steiner Education course and began a different direction. Then, after four more years, undertook a Grad Dip in Adolescent Health and Welfare course where as a final project, she led a student group that created wooden totem poles expressing each child's own individual emotional symbols.

Eventually, after 40 years of teaching, Sara retired and intended to bury herself in her garden. However, after some time, she looked for something else and Gillian Schofield offered her a few make-up painting lessons with John Lawry. He was not overly impressed with her paper, acrylics and brushes that she brought to class, offering her oils and a canvas instead. After she overcame her fear of 'real' painting, Sara discovered a passion that she had never known and has been painting ever since.

Gillian then invited Sara to a GEAS Portraiture session at her house, where she met other GEAS members. She then began the weekly Studio Arts classes and during the term, Yvette Wroby asked if she would take minutes at the Committee meetings. This became the Secretary's role, then Vice President's role and finally the President's role, while curating and planning the GEAS exhibition at the Breslin Gallery. Sara spent years attending Life Drawing sessions, Portraiture, Studio Art plus her continued independent lessons with John Lawry and Life Drawing sessions with Yvonne Audette. Pre-COVID, Sara painted most days while attending various Life Drawing groups.

Sara is a hugely talented and versatile artist with a keen eye for composition and colour. She is prolific and participated in all GEAS and *Paint in the Park/Cityscape* exhibitions, and also curated the "*GEAS Members Exhibition*" at the Breslin Gallery. Her first solo exhibition "*Aperture*" was finally held during April 2021 at Red Gallery in North Fitzroy, after being postponed for over 12 months due to Covid-19.

Personally, Sara was married for nearly 20 years and has three children. Although she has returned to the US many times for visits to family and friends, Australia is definitely home. Sara is also an avid gardener and has re-designed her garden many times. Her front garden is her refuge and she can often be found sitting in her front veranda with her nose buried in a book, a cuppa beside her and her cat at her feet.

A Message from Abroad

Barney Davey lives in Scottsdale, Arizona. He is an

artist whose mission to "inspire artists to live their dreams and learn art business skills" has led him to develop an 'Art Marketing Toolkit Project'. Whilst he is not a GEAS member, the thoughts he shared with his art group on being an older



artist are poignant. The following is one of his Facebook posts which will resonate with many of our artists.

Creativity and talent are ageless. You see it

everywhere. There is much to celebrate about being young. And many of our brightest lights got their start and made their mark as youngsters. Bob Dylan and Albert Einstein did their best work before they were 25. But both went on to prove that they still had much to give in later years. Dylan is touring in his 80s. As nutrition, science, and technology improve, people are aging better than previous generations. I read a recent quote from the president of the AARP. He said, "Aging is a privilege". Think about it. It's so true. Most of us can expect to live longer than our parents if we retain some modicum of health that is both a privilege and a blessing.

Older artists have much to give and to do. Some bring decades of experience to a group like this. And others are reaching out to learn how to tap into their creativity for the first time. Or maybe they seek to reconnect with long-dormant skill sets and interests. It doesn't matter because it's all good. It's all relevant, and all are welcome. This group is about celebrating being an older artist, whatever that means to you. I don't have a big overarching goal or plan for starting the group. It's here to offer insights, support, and encouragement to all who join. We'll do pretty much as we've always done, and we'll figure it out as we go along.

Elizabet (Lizzie) Wolf (24.9.1928 - 9.7.2021)

We are saddened to report the passing of Elizabeth (Lizzie) Wolf.

Born in Vienna, Lizzie arrived to Australia in 1938 aged ten with her parents and her twin sister (Sue Copolov), and lived in Sydney for a while before moving to Melbourne.

A very talented child with artistic inclinations she ultimately studied art at RMIT – painting, drawing, sculpture and textile design. On the strength of the works she produced during her course, she was snapped up by Myers to design and set up their display windows, and has worked there for many years.

Following in the footsteps of her sister, Lizzie joined GEAS in November 2009 (the year the Society was created) and was an active participant in Studio Art.

She is survived and sadly missed by Sue and by her nieces and nephews, and is fondly remembered by her fellow artists at Studio Art.




Sara Friedman – Seagulls at Play
